

The children of Nuñoa really need our help. About a third of the households are poor and many parents cannot afford to feed their children or give them what they need to thrive. They are very appreciative of what the project is doing for them.

The alpacas, on which much of their economic survival depends, need our help as well. A vaccine that would save the lives of countless crias (baby alpacas) which die suddenly every year of enterotoxemia costs just 50 cents per animal. Vaccine use and implementation of other husbandry practices would have a great impact on the animals in the Nuñoa area and therefore on the lives of the farmers who depend on them for their income.


